7. Explanation of the Change:

With the impending programmatic split within Sociology as Criminal Justice (CJ) becomes its own major, the Sociology program needs to update its curriculum to better serve students. This proposed update includes the removal of the CJ specialization from the program as students seeking a career in a CJ-related field would be better prepared for that career through the new CJ major. We have also removed the Human Services (HS) specialization from the program by incorporating those courses (SOC 270, SOC 315, and SOC 320) into the "core" classes of the major which all Sociology students are required to take. As students will no longer be required to choose between the two specializations, the Sociology faculty believe that leaving a single specialization in the program would only unnecessarily confuse students.

We have also rearranged our other core courses within the major by submitting a new Capstone course that will work for both SOC and CJ students. We are also combining our previous Methods/Statistics courses into a new Data Analysis course (CJUS 3xx) that will be able to better prepare students for applied work and research within their fields. We have also added an experiential requirement within the program to increase student practical skills and attractiveness on the job market. Students will be required to take at least 1 credit hour of The Traveling Classroom (SS 360) OR at least 1 credit hour of Field Experience (SOC 396). SS 360 is offered every other year and offers students an opportunity to tour several institutions related to criminal justice (e.g., South

Dakota State Penitentiary, the Board of Pardons and Paroles, etc.) and human service/social work (e.g., rehabilitation agencies) across the state. SOC 396 offers students the chance to experience work within various organizations and build professional networks that will assist them in their careers and is available for students to take every semester. We have also rearranged the 15 credit hours of electives into 3 categories to help guide students in their choices in ways that will encourage them to learn the most relevant content and skills for their future jobs.

The number of required credit hours in the major has increased to 39 to reflect the inclusion of the 2-credit hour first year seminar (IDL 190) required of all incoming students and the 1-credit our experiential requirement. This is broken into 24-credit hours within the "core" requirements all Sociology majors will take and 15-credit hours of electives.

As we are not proposing any new courses within this curriculum – only replacing existing ones with newer, more relevant versions – we would be able to offer these courses on a regular rotation similar to our current offering without issues of faculty workload and ensure timely completion for students. Currently, several sections of SOC 100 are offered each semester. We also wish to increase our offerings of SOC 150 (Social Problems) to at least one section per semester in the future. This increases the amount of available sections for our introductory courses within the major but also our offerings within the general education curriculum for goal 3 (Social Science). All other core classes within the program will be offered on an annual basis with electives rotating bi-annually.
