## 6. Explanation of the Change:

These changes largely reflect the new course additions that have been made through revisions to the Native and Indigenous Studies minor (previously the American Indian Studies minor) and the new Behavioral Forensic Sciences certificate over the last year so that students may receive credit within their majors. First, there are additions to the elective options in the “Stratification and Inequality” electives (SOC/INDG 265, SOC/SPCM/INDG 333). We have also added the course Federal Indian Law (CJUS/HIST/INDG 333) to the elective options under “Social Institutions.” Criminology for Human Services/Counseling Practice (CJUS 468) and Victim Advocacy (SOC 487) have been as general electives within the program. Finally, we have also added SS/INDG 361 as a third option to our 1-credit hour “Field Experience” requirement.
